Learn About San Francisco and World War II Anxiety at the San Francisco Museum and Historical Society Monthly Meeting

On Tuesday, February 14 in the Roosevelt Middle School Auditorium, John Freeman will give a presentation titled, "WAR ANXIETY GRIPS HOMEFRONT SAN FRANCISCO." Freeman will explain how after the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, many local citizens feared that San Francisco and its surroundings could be the logical mainland target for enemy submarine or air attacks.

In commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the U.S. entry into World War II, John Freeman will examine the profound changes brought on by these events: rationing, salvaging, and volunteering; suspicions of espionage resulting in the detention of German and Italian residents and the denial of civil rights to all Japanese residents; the arrival of military personnel to embark to the Pacific Front; and new residents lured to work in the massive local war industry. Home front San Francisco was dynamic and stressful, and would have profound physical and social changes for the future of the region.
